2020 In Review

What can we say about 2020? It started out to be a year of much hope and promise, but by the middle of March, everything changed. We had already begun planning for our 6th Annual Dog Days of Summer. We were in the middle of revamping our food for seniors' pets, Paws in Motion, with Family and Community Services. With the economy humming, we were looking forward to record breaking fund raising year. But Covid put an end to all those plans.

Our fund raising was reduced by 2/3 and our Paws in Motion plans had to be paused due to changes at Family & Community Services and other Covid related complications. Our investment portfolio thru the Portage Foundation went on an up and down roller coaster ride and ended up with negative growth. Despite all that, thanks to our many generous donors and supporters, we were still able to make a number of monetary donations totaling \$9,200. Among our beneficiaries this year were: Portage Animal Protective League, Portage County Dog Warden, Happy Trails Farm Animal Sanctuary, Rose's Rescue and our veterinary animal emergency fund.

WHAT GOES INTO PLANNING DOG DAYS?

Most people don't realize what goes into planning an outdoor event like Dog Days. When I tell people it takes as much as 6 months or longer to plan, they are shocked. So, let us take you thru the steps.

First, we need to get it on the City calendar and Hometown Bank's calendar, since we use not only a city street (which needs to be closed), but also the Hometown Plaza. Next, we need to submit the details and a sketch of the area to the city for approval. Once all the preliminaries are approved, it's time to start contacting the participants.

We send out notices to all of the vendors who have had booths with us in the past inviting them to reserve their space. We also line up our bands and select food vendors that we think would offer a good variety of food and beverages.

Meanwhile, there is a lot of paperwork to be done. Applications must be filed with the state for a one day liquor permit for the sale of beer. Arrangements have to be made with a beer distributor for the purchase and delivery of kegs. Woodsy's Music has to be booked for the intricate sound system that is used. A sign with all major sponsors' names and logos is ordered. Arrangements have to be finalized with the Parks & Rec Department for the delivery of picnic tables, and a sanitation company must be hired for Port-a-Pots as required by the Health Department.

It is important to make a schedule of all the events, such as the parade, the contests, the band schedule and announcements. We meet with Jeff Kurtz, our emcee, to go over the schedule for the announcements and any other last minute details. A street layout with booth assignments has to be drawn up and on Friday morning, before there is too much traffic, we (along with Mayor Jerry Fiala) have to measure off the booth space and with spray paint, mark and number them for the vendors to find their location.

Sponsors are solicited, and tee shirts are designed and ordered from Beth at Stone Hill Farm. Flyers are printed and distributed around town. Pat Reynolds starts working on the dog quilt for the annual raffle. Buddy Sessions Top Dog contestants are announced and voting begins.

The day before the event, we have to pick up special weather radios from the Kent Police Department so we can monitor the weather in case of severe storm warnings. The police also put notices on the parking meters that no parking is permitted on Saturday. Then we cross our fingers and hope that the weatherman is kind to us.

We start arriving around 8:00am to begin set up. Before we can open to the public on Saturday morning at 11:00, the Health Department has to inspect and give their okay. A maintenance man from the water department arrives to put a spigot on the fire hydrant at the corner of Main and North Water so we can have access to fresh water for all the bowls we put out for the dogs.

Our usual set up crew arrives early to deliver tables and get everything set up. The crew consists of many people, but every year we can count on Darrin & Michelle Hartman, Bob Mayfield, Mayor Jerry Fiala, Joe Latina and many others. Our photographers, EmiLee Hartman and Nicole Cunningham are there in time to take pictures of the activity and the dogs as they arrive. Picnic tables are set up on the street.

Vendors and food trucks start arriving at 9:00, when the street is closed. Water bowls for the dogs are filled and distributed all along N. Water St. The sound system is given one final test. And finally, at 11:00 sharp, Dog Days of Summer officially begins! Hope you can join us – mark your calendars now.

With a mix of paved and natural trails, there is something for everyone. For those hearty hikers, challenge yourself to complete the 2021 Wild Hikes Challenge by the end of the year, where you log your walks and complete either 30 hikes or 30 miles to commemorate the 30th anniversary of the Portage Park District. Complete the hikes and you are eligible for a hiking stick and medallion, and your pup can also earn a bandana! The Park District Foundation has also partnered with North Water Brewing to host a "Yappy Hour" the third Tuesday of each month this summer.
